Will you work to expand diversionary programs so that, whenever possible, adverse impact of the criminal justice system is avoided or limited?

I strongly believe in encouraging law enforcement to implement pre-arrest diversion programs that prevent people from entering the system. I would work to expand access to the drug court, to bring a Veteran's Court to Cumberland County, and create prosecutor-based diversion programs whenever possible. Limiting individuals' criminal justice contact is key to help people avoid cycling in and out of the system and focuses resources appropriately to address people who are high-risk and pose community safety concerns.

5. A non-partisan official audit estimated that Maine spent almost \$160,000 per juvenile inmate and over \$42,000 per adult inmate for an average annual cost to taxpayers in 2012 about \$53,000 per inmate per year of incarceration. Will you institute a policy that Assistant District Attorneys must enter and justify the cost of incarceration on the record in plea and sentencing proceedings?

Please describe here what policies your office will institute to address the problems of the growing cost to taxpayers of increasing populations in Maine correctional facilities and damage to the employment and families from jail and prison time in light of the lack of real rehabilitation services and the high rates of recidivism following release from Maine correctional facilities. As District Attorney I would seek to increase diversion programs, use treatment models, and seek to reserve incarceration for the most serious offenses. Resources allocated to incarceration, in many instances, would be better used in furtherance of rehabilitation, supporting incarcerated persons transitioning into the community and strengthening community resources that would more effectively address some of the main drivers of criminal activity. I believe the cost of incarceration should be a factor at sentencing, but not the only factor. The cost to tax payers fails to account for the cost to the community and family unit when a person is removed from society and placed into custody. For those reasons, I would not mandate this information be provided in every plea and sentencing proceeding, but I would expect it to be provided in certain cases.

I have visited the Immigrant Resource Center of Maine, and then attended a training by the center's executive director; I attended the Building Bridges Conference; the Equality Maine Dinner; the MLK Dinner and look forward to having frequent community involvement.

Immigration

It would not be standard to inquire about the immigration status of a crime victim or witness, but in some instances, it may be necessary. For example, in cases of domestic violence often times immigration status

can be used as a tool of power and control and may be relevant in a case. I would not participate in collecting this type of information in a formal, systemic way.

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15. Will you pledge to require, when possible, that juvenile trauma histories, other special needs, gender issues and
so forth be considered at all points in the process when evaluating whether a youth should be incarcerated, diverted,
or subject to other dispositions?

Juvenile cases must each be addressed on an individual basis and in a manner that looks at each juvenile's individual needs to adequately craft a disposition that is fair and does justice. This requires considering the juvenile's trauma and other history, and any other special needs that factor into creating a supportive and safe environment for these youth.

### Discovery

16. Maine's Rules of Criminal Procedure and U.S. Supreme Court decisions following <u>Brady v. Maryland</u>, 373 U.S. 83 (1963) require prosecutors to produce all evidence favorable to defendants even if known only to law enforcement or not requested by defense counsel. Will you institute and enforce particular policies, staff trainings and procedures to comply with these legal discovery requirements?

I am currently the Head of the Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence and Elder Abuse Unit for the Kennebec County District Attorney's Office. I am an aggressive advocate on behalf of victims of violence and passionate about criminal justice reform. After earning a B.A. from Brandeis University and my law degree from Boston University School of Law, I began my legal career clerking for the Maine Superior Court and went on to represent indigent clients, prior to becoming a prosecutor in 2013. Having participated in the system from all sides, I have a unique perspective. I would like to see the criminal justice system become more equitable, reserving incarceration for perpetrators of violent criminal conduct and an increase in diversion and treatment for lower level offenders. What sets me apart from other candidates is that I have both the vision of what criminal justice reforms need to be made and the experience and knowledge to implement those changes. I am the only progressive candidate that has worked both in a modern district attorney's office as a prosecutor and as an administrator and in private practice as a defense attorney. These experiences have allowed me to see criminal practice from all sides.
